

### NSFAS funding for first time entering (FTENS)

- Bursary applicants from households with R350 000 annual income or less.
- First-time applications handled centrally via NSFAS. Status must be tracked through myNSFAS portal.
- Appeals for rejected but eligible students must be made directly to NSFAS through myNSFAS.
- Applications for 2025 closed on 15 December 2024.
- Loan applications from households with an annual income of between R350 001 and R600 000 annually.



NSFAS will continue making funding decisions as academic results are received and processed. Students can track their NSFAS funding eligibility via myNSFAS portal. Results for supplementary and deferred exams will only be submitted to NSFAS when available.



Previously NSFAS funded students transferring from another university must verify eligibility for continued funding; the N+1 funding rule still applies, as all years of study at a university are counted.

# Significant changes in NSFAS funding policy

The most notable change in NSFAS funding policy is the cap imposed on the amount of funds NSFAS will allocate to funded students for accommodation. The NSFAS capping of accommodation has had a significant impact on the university for NSFAS funded students. The university has actively worked on finding ways to mitigate the impact of this funding shortfall on students, but the shortfall amount has been too significant - the shortfall is over R110 million. Students are required to apply to external funders, look at loan options or crowdfunding to try to help meet the NSFAS funding shortfall. Only a collective effort will help reduce the impact of the NSFAS accommodation cap. Where it has been possible, funds raised have been used to assist as many students as possible that meet the funders criteria with a contribution towards the shortfall.







### **UCT GAP funding**

Students who met the NSFAS eligibility for the NSFAS Loan programme but do not meet the NSFAS 70% STEM programme requirement will be assisted with UCT GAP funding.

GAP funding is exclusively financed by UCT in line with the funding policy terms Information on UCT's GAP funding programme is available on the financial aid web pages.


It provides finance to designated "missing middle" students and students studying towards degrees in scarce skills professions

## Other funding

• Funding from corporates, non-governmental institutions and sponsors is provided directly to eligible students but is administered with the assistance of UCT.

• The requirements for academic and financial eligibility are determined by these funders and vary according to the programme of study.

• All students remain responsible for their fee debt, so any delays with funding confirmations or pay-outs must be addressed directly by the students.





### NSFAS appeals for 2025 funding that has been stopped due to poor academic performance in 2024 or the N+ rule

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NSFAS will manage all appeals directly on the myNSFAS portal.

Students that have not met academic renewal requirements or the N+ rule must submit an online appeal with the required supporting documents by logging onto their myNSFAS portal and submitting the appeal directly to NSFAS.

NSFAS allows for 30 days to submit an appeal from the date the appeal tab is activated. It is therefore important to monitor your MYNSFAS portal account. In the interim, gather all your documents to support your appeal

 UCT is not able to provide relief for international students, including Southern African Development Community (SADC) students.



> Limited funding through excellence awards for meritorious students is also available. This initiative serves to strengthen the university's commitment to transformation at postgraduate level.



# **Postgraduate diplomas**

No financial aid support is available for advanced diplomas, postgraduate certificates, and postgraduate diplomas. No appeal process is available for financial aid and fee debt.



Applicants for need-based funding will undergo a UCT means test using information provided by the applicant. UCT's need-based funding from the General Operating Budget (GOB) is divided into two categories: • PG Financial Aid: Applicants with a combined annual household gross income of les than R350 000 are eligible for funding to cover their partial cost of attendance (PCOA).

• PG Gap Tuition Bursary: Applicants with a combined household gross income between R350 001 and R600 000 are eligible for funding to cover a percentage of their tuition fees. This award does not include support towards accommodation costs, either in UCT residence or private accommodation, nor does it include monthly allowances.

Funding is not available for occasional studies, professional degrees with less than a 33.3% research component, or postgraduate diplomas and certificates.
